Arrowmen serve ISU

The past couple of days Arrowmen have been seen giving service to the ISU campus as part of the Operation Service project. Participation qualifies as a requirement for this year's Brotherhood Award, and participants also have the chance to earn an Operation Service patch. At a glance, one might assume Arrowmen were merely fulfilling a requirement or trying to earn the patch, but a closer look into Operation Service gives a closer look at the true purpose of the Order—unselfish service.

Operation Service developed out of a similar project from the 2003 Indian Summer conference, where attendees participated in mandatory service in order to earn the participation award.

Operation Service is the largest scale service project that has ever been conducted at a national event. Over the past two days, over 450 Arrowmen have joined together to give well over 1,000 hours of service both on and off the ISU campus. Jim O'Hara of Bob White Lodge says, "I was glad to give to the campus. They give so much to us. I wasn't hesitant at all to give back." Brian Cutino, chairman for Operation Service, related that many of the Arrowmen who participated on Monday afternoon returned again on Tuesday.

On Monday alone, Arrowmen participated in 11 different projects, including spreading mulch, picking up trash, and washing patio areas around campus. Other projects consisted of moving rocks and debris around the intramural fields at Wallace and Wilson Hall, as well as filling several depressions on the fields.

Arrowmen also helped rake around Lake LaVerne, clean the gravel out of several parking lots, haul and chip limbs, and work on paths. Tuesday's projects filled completely up and overflowed with volunteers as Arrowmen continued to help paint chain link fences, pick up garbage, spread mulch, and wash patios.

Arrowmen have also ventured beyond the ISU campus for two projects at the Ames Police Department and Hunziker Youth Sports Complex. According to Cutino, Arrowmen provided huge service for the Ames Police Department moving cross ties for the pistol range, repairing a house also used in firing practice, as well as weeding and picking up discharged shells.

Operation Service has been a great success reports Cutino, who expects to see similar projects conducted at future NOACs. Franklin Hyatt, a first time NOAC attendee of Anpetu-We Shawnee Lodge, who spent several hours on Monday afternoon painting chain link fences, agrees with Cutino, stating "I had fun doing (painting). It should definitely be kept at every NOAC." Russell Smart, Associate Adviser for Atta Kulla Kulla Lodge, responded, "It's what the OA should always be about—service."

When asked for his thoughts about Operation Service, Brian summed up the project stating, "It's a great thing for the OA. Participants are living the dream of E. Urner Goodman, giving service... We're here learning and giving back too!"

In yesterday's National Council of Chiefs meeting, the 2004 National Officers introduced a new award and service initiative to our Order.

In the coming years, the Order of the Arrow will be guided towards performing more service to our council camps and the communities in which we live. As such, the new *Leadership in Service Award* was created to encourage Arrowmen and lodges to pursue these endeavors.

The award can be earned for the next three years and works much like the Arrowman Service Award. Requirements call for 8 hours of service benefiting a Council camp and 6 hours of participation in a lodge or
