The lodge decided to charter a bus to finish their journey to NOAC. Luckily, they were able to convince the airline to assist with the bus fee, and they were soon back on their way to NOAC.

The lodge arrived Sunday morning from their 12-hour overnight trip, just before several members of the lodge were due to compete in American Indian dance. Fourteen of the boys placed in the top 10 rankings in various styles, earning spots in the finals. "It had an impact, strangely enough, but was not all negative," adviser Anthony Carranco said Sunday about the extended trip. "I think it inspired the boys to do better."

Spotlight on **Western Region** Chief, David Harrell

For David Harrell, his third experience at NOAC has been very different from his first two. In fact, being the Western Region Chief has changed much of David's life. David is an Eagle Scout and Vigil Honor member of Kola Lodge in Section W-5, and a senior business administration major at Colorado State University. For the "Lend-a-Hand Society"

Dr. Edward Everett Hale of Boston was the great nephew of the Revolutionary War patriot Nathan Hale, a Unitarian minister and an author – his most famous work was The Man Without a Country.

In 1870, Dr. Hale's book Ten Times One Is Ten appeared. It told the story of Henry Wadsworth, a wide-ranging traveler who was the perfect example of Ten continued for years. In 1913, British practical charity. Among his many good acts he saved a boy headed in the wrong direction by mentoring him and saved a mining town by standing up to the ruffians who wanted to take it over.

recipients of his kindness, traveling home day. from his funeral, happened to meet in a railway station. Informally, they formed a club to carry on the good work of their benefactor, under the inspiration of the principles by which he lived, called the Wadsworth Mottoes":

Look up and not down; Look forward and not back; Look out and not in; and Lend a hand.

By seeking to do good to others throughout their lives, each on their own, they multiplied their numbers so that within 30 years more than 1 billion people, estimated to be the world's and love.

The book inspired people to form "Lend a Hand Clubs" and "Ten Times One Clubs" based on the Wadsworth Mottoes. Dr. Hale and his friends began publishing a Lend a Hand Record, organized the Ten Times One Corporation to support the work of these clubs, Edward Everett Hale and offered a loose form of national organization. The national organization recognized any club that adopted the Wadsworth Mottoes and had as at least one of its objects, "the uplifting of some person, neighborhood, or institution outside of the Club itself." Many youth groups grew from Lend a Hand and, by the turn of the century, claimed more than five-and-a-half million members.

The popularity of Ten Times One is Scouter John Hargrave, who later became famous as the founder of the Green Shirts social movement, published his book Lonecraft and included the Wadsworth Mottoes as an inspirational piece. When Harry died at an early age, ten Lend a Hand Societies continue to this

> One of the groups arising after the popularity of Lend a Hand was the Brotherhood of Andrew & Phillip. The Brotherhood had two rules, Prayer and Service. It was devoted to improving the lives, not of its members, but of those who were not members. It was focused not on organization, but on building relationships between one young man and another in a friendship that would encourage religious life – that is, on things of the spirit. By 1909 it had spread to Tioga Presbyterian Church in Philadelphia where one of the chapter's founders was an enthusiastic and talented 18-year-old called "Goodie" – E. Urner Goodman.

Airport shuttle notice

- * 3rd stop: McNutt Quad on Fee Lane (The bus will load on Fee Lane and depart for the airport when loaded).

The bus will have both staff and lodge contingents. We will not allow any groups to "jump" on to buses before the assigned times. Please plan on additional time to get to the pick up points via the internal shuttle (begins at 2:30 a.m.) or walking as required.
